ANALYSIS

3. What contributed to student success and/or lack of success? *

Like many courses this course is set up to assess learning through multiple outcomes. It also tailors to students' diverse learning styles by offering multiple assessments. I believe this contributes to student success. What leads to lack of success is if students are unwilling or too overloaded to be able to put adequate work into the course

On questions 3–5 on the student evaluations students reported an increase in the amount of understanding and ability to apply/evaluate sociological perspectives/phenomena. Additionally, they are verifiable methods with proof of student learning of concepts, theories, comprehension, and the ability to actively express their learning outwardly.

This term was very "interesting". The college was closed for the first two weeks due to weather, than I was very ill the next week. This resulted in students not having face to face time for the first three weeks of class. As a result I awarded students an additional 24 points at the end of the term. I calculated this based on the difference in scores for the first several tests comparatively to previous terms.

Additionally, the different in outcomes 1&2 completion totals and that of the percentage of students success in achievement was due to one student being one point away from success. For, outcome 3, there were two students that were exactly at the bare minimum for success. A difference of plus or minus one point would have made the numbers look more in line, at times this happens.
