I think the best new addition this term was the use of a take-home final, which was based on their readings in our text. I gave it out at the beginning of the term, and showed them how to find the answers in the first couple of chapters in our text. They did really well on the final, and they all admitted that it added a great deal to their understanding of film. In addition, as the term progressed, students became more sophisticated in their choices of films to watch on their own. For example, several students reported that they wouldn't have watched an Alfred Hitchcock movie, until they realized how seminal he is to modern film, both in America and in

What contributed to student success and/or lack of success? *	Well, first of all, I must mention that I had a mature bunch of students, including four vets and several students who were taking my class as their only summer class. They were motivated, and mature enough to realize that they needed to get as much out of the compressed class as they could get.

They all indicated they had grown in their understanding and critical assessment of film as a cultural phenomenon.

Yes, I believe so. As stated above, I was dealing with a rare group. One student is going on in film studies, and the rest were mature and eager to learn.

Several students said they would have enjoyed my lecturing/discussing more of the material covered in the book over the course of the term, instead of letting them dig it out for themselves in the take-home final. Next time, I will try to mention several "nuggets" from each chapter to help them know what to look for and to advance their appreciation for film studies.
